I decided to avoid entering Mexico through Tijuana, as it has such a bad press. So, I took a small road that took me out to Tecate. Famous for a Baja brewery, located there. I took some good video of the ride to Tecate, it was a B-road which was being resurfaced. They were operating a convoy system to take traffic through the road works. Naturally I cruise past the cars up to the front and I think I have captured some great abuse as a wild red-neck shouts at me from his truck, for who knows for what reason, riding a bike I guess, or not lining up and waiting my turn....



I stopped by the local fridge recycling store.

I fear that my hotel has such a weak internet connection that I can't post video from here. Which is disappointing because this is the best hotel I plan to stay in before Cabo and secondly, I've paid \$5 for a useless connection.



Anyway the border crossing was simple, I showed my US licence and insurance and he waived me through.

Mexico Day 2

Mileage - 187

Total -1,668

Wow best day yet. Started late and rode from El Rosarito to Ensenada. Fabulous road and views of the beaches.

I stopped for a quick lunch at a 7/11 and did my good deed for the day, an old American woman had been robbed and needed money to call

home and get money wired out to her, so I gave her a few hundred Pesos



Ensenada it largish and dusty, so I rode on south down Mex-1 and then picked a dirt road that would take me to the sea.



The road was really tough – but the KTM lapped it up. Then I had a little tumble! At least I now know that I am strong enough to lift the bike off the deck :)



Just a dumb low speed tumble into the soft dirt, no damage done. I had a couple of "offs" and its nice to get it out of the way, I was bound to fall off at some point. It reminded of when I used to ride UK race tracks, I went a very long time before I fell off and the longer you go, the more you are waiting for that first "off", nice to get it out of the way early!

Mexico Day 3

California Baja Sur

Today - 301

Total - 1,969

The day started early as my Canadian friends decided that I should join them for breakfast. So we found a little shack that actually produced really good omelettes.



The 3 Canadians are actually part of a team of 6 practicing for the Baja 1000, which starts on 14-November. Its a 1,000 mile straight race on dirt, stone and sand, all off road and they start at 1 am at night and race non-stop to the end! It takes about 28-hours if you are any good, night and day!! Insane. And if that's not bad enough, it is just like the Dakar

rally, where they also race with buggies and lorries!! And it sounds like they go faster off-road than I go on-road.



These are their bike – like the Dakar they are limited to 450cc.

There are 2 older guys, Guy and his mate competing in the Pro 50 class and Guy's son. The older guys were ready



waiting for the lad – who's bike was still outside his room



so instead of waiting for the lift -



he took the stairs!



They did give me some good advice – about riding in sand and also more warnings about riding at night – There are cows that wander freely here and when the sun goes down the temperature drops quickly, so the cows come and lay on the road because its still warm!! And the roads aren't lit and nor are the cows!



I set off around 10:30 knowing I had a long and boring ride through the desert, there is one road called Mex-1 and it runs from Le Roserio 250 miles to the next gas station just before the border into California Baja Sur. The Baja has two states, draw a line in the middle and you have California Baha, which everyone knows is in the north! and then California Baja Sur (south) which is not so easy to find hence the helpful suffix!!



Anyway my bike has a range of about 250 miles, if ridden gently and about 200 miles if ridden hard. Annoyingly ridding gently is not an option, so I had to rely on buying some roadside gas from the back of a truck.



The first half of the ride was fun, winding through mountains initially and then deeper and deeper in the desert. It was 90-100 F today so it must be horrible in the summer!

The Cactus are amazing, huge! 20 feet++



Then there is a crazy section of boulders, which I videoed (post later)

After about 110 miles I came to Catavina, the only small town on the route, which one hotel and a gas waggon!



Fab!

Fill me up!

Amazingly the hotel is brand new 5^* – so I stopped for lunch and beer \$10! and rode on



The second half was long straight and boring, the last 30 miles to the CBS border is just one straight road, zzzzzz.

Just after the border was my target, Geurrero Negro, I arrived at 4pm, so 300 miles in 5 1/2 hours was not bad.

I found a hotel



Chained up my bike and went in search of a Cerveza! Didn't fall off once today! Wahoo!
